

Public School Building Inspections

Regional Services

Our Regional Services team provides a wide array of services to educators and community members across Boone and Winnebago Counties. With the recent addition of a bilingual team member, we are now proud to offer all of our regional services in both English and Spanish.

Bus Driver Training

ROE4 administers the mandatory training required for all school bus drivers in the region. New drivers must complete an eight-hour course in bus driver safety and first aid to receive their initial permit. Experienced drivers must attend a two-hour annual refresher workshop within the 12-month period prior to renewing their certification.

Educator Licensure

The ROE4 Licensure Team supports current and aspiring educators with all aspects of the complex licensure landscape. We actively guide individuals through the process they need - from the initial application or adding endorsements to an existing license, to annual registration and renewal.

ROE4 is proud to assist with a variety of license types, including:

- Professional Educator License (PEL)
- Administrator License
- Career & Technical License (CTE)
- Transitional Bilingual Educator (TBE)
- Substitute & Short-Term Sub (SUB & STS)
- Paraprofessional (PARA)

By streamlining this process, ROE4 minimizes administrative burdens, ensuring dedicated, licensed educators remain in our schools to maximize student success.

Homeschooling

Homeschooling is considered a form of private education in Illinois, meaning that families are responsible for researching and implementing educational materials for their child's learning. ROE4 provides resources and guidance related to this process.



Minor Work Permits

In partnership with the Illinois Department of Labor, ROE4 issues permits to eligible minors who reside in Boone and Winnebago Counties and meet all requirements outlined in Section 12 of the Illinois Child Labor Law.

Background Checks

ROE4 is a licensed Live Scan fingerprint and background check vendor, authorized to conduct checks for any Illinois school district or company requiring them. The Illinois School Code requires all new school employees to have both a State and FBI criminal background check. ROE4 provides these via electronic fingerprinting services for its own staff, several contracted regional organizations, and school districts. (105 ILCS 5/10-21.9)

Pearson VUE Testing Center

ROE4's Testing Center, which is a certified Pearson VUE Testing Center, offers a wide variety of professional, academic, and licensure-based exams to our region, utilizing the full range of Pearson VUE testing options. Additionally, we specifically offer the WorkKeys Paraprofessional Exam at our center for individuals pursuing their paraprofessional license.

High School Equivalency (HSE)

For individuals who do not complete high school, an alternative path is available through the High School Equivalency (HSE) Certificate. ROE4 offers HSE exams in English or Spanish at our Pearson VUE Testing Center to those who are 17 years of age or older. All fees are collected by Pearson VUE at registration. We also provide proctored HSE testing for local inmates housed at the Winnebago County Jail. (105 ILCS 5/3-15.12)

Transcript Review & Ordering

ROE4 is the custodian of records for Boone and Winnebago County residents completing the HSE process. Our office can verify completion of HSE to candidates and their designated recipients at no cost and can generate official transcripts and diplomas upon request with payment.

Health Life Safety

ROE4 ensures the Health, Life, and Safety (HLS) compliance of all public school buildings in Boone and Winnebago Counties through a continuous inspection process. Working in conjunction with the Office of the State Fire Marshal, we conduct annual inspections and review reports to guarantee compliance with the Illinois School Code. These yearly reports are filed with the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) and shared directly with the districts. ROE4 also oversees the required 10-Year Safety Survey, which involves a licensed architect or engineer resurveying every public building. (105 ILCS 5/3-14.21)

Compliance

We conduct Technical Assistance Visits (TAVs), during which our School Safety team reviews documents such as board policies, statemandated curriculum, student records, and staff/personnel records, while also ensuring compliance with HLS standards. The results are incorporated into the Illinois Report Card, serving as a vital tool to improve school operations and support the delivery of topquality educational programs for students.

Construction and Building Permits

ROE4 plays a crucial role in overseeing the physical safety of public school facilities by reviewing all construction and remodeling plans to ensure code compliance. Our office is responsible for issuing all required Building Permits and the final School Occupancy Permits for public schools. In coordination with licensed architects and engineers, we also provide approval the use of temporary and mobile classroom units.

Truants' Alternative and Optional Education Program (TAOEP)

Our Attendance Intervention Program has provided truancy intervention services to our school districts within our two-county region for over fifteen years. Our eight interventionists engage with students after school districts have implemented their own interventions without success. Once a student has been referred, one of our attendance interventionists meets with the student, their guardian, school personnel, and other key stakeholders to develop a personalized intervention plan aimed at addressing the underlying causes of truancy. We work closely with school-based and community resources to remove barriers and create sustainable solutions that support long-term attendance improvement.

Court Services

ROE4 is responsible for receiving and managing court petitions for our 13 school districts as well as providing continuous support and intervention to the students. When our interventions do not lead to meaningful progress, we may submit a petition to the State's Attorney's Office as a final option. Court involvement is always a rehabilitative, not punitive, process.

McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Program

Our Homeless Education Program is dedicated to partnering with local school districts to uphold the requirements of the federal McKinney-Vento Act. Our primary objective is to facilitate equal educational access for all homeless children and youth.

We specifically assist districts in fulfilling their mandate to be proactive in identifying and locating homeless children and youth who may not be currently attending school.

Student Support Interventionist (SSI) Program

Developed this year, our Student Support Interventionists (SSIs) provide academic, behavioral, social-emotional, and attendance support to students in grades K-12 from within their own school.

Their mission is to bridge the gap between home and school, ensuring that every student has the resources, encouragement, and guidance needed to succeed.

Summit Academy

Summit Academy is an alternative education program operated by ROE4. We serve students in grades 6–12 across Boone and Winnebago Counties.

In partnership with our 13 local school districts, we provide a safe, relationship-driven setting where students can re-engage with learning, rebuild confidence, and set new goals for their future. Our goal is to reset, connect, restore, and return every student to their sending school.

Summit is a Regional Safe Schools Program (RSSP)*, part of an Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE)-funded initiative for students who have been suspended, expelled, or are at risk due to serious behavioral or academic challenges.

We also serve students through the Alternative Learning Opportunities Program (ALOP)** and the Truants' Alternative and Optional Education Program (TAOEP)***.

School Improvement Planning

ROE 4's School Improvement Directors support area schools by providing coaching, leadership, and assistance in building customized school improvement plans and designing tailored professional development for School Improvement (SIP) days.

Anytime Learning Library

In FY25, we transitioned from our previous Learning Management System (LMS) to the new Anytime Learning Library. Launched at the beginning of the school year, this platform significantly expanded our offerings by providing 11 new, asynchronous courses to our region.

Safety Audits

In FY25, our Director of School Safety completed specialized training needed certified to provide comprehensive facility security assessments for school buildings and grounds. This systematic audit utilizes a specialized mobile application designed for education agencies, allowing personnel to thoroughly examine physical features, traffic flow, parking lots, landscaping, and lighting to assess safety, security, accessibility, and emergency preparedness. The assessment results provide detailed recommendations for facility improvements, essential information to share with first responders, and relevant resources on education, facility, and preparedness topics.

Reunification Trainings

ROE4 hosted two Reunification Training events during FY25. These trainings brought together local educators, safety teams, and first responders to establish a unified approach for safely and effectively reuniting students with families during and after an emergency.



Behavioral Threat Assessment Training

In FY25, ROE4 offered two sessions of the "Before the Crisis," a Behavioral Threat Assessment Training to regional school leaders, fulfilling the new legal requirement for establishing threat assessment teams. This workshop provides comprehensive training based on nationally recognized best practices, equipping participants to assess threat severity, analyze student and staff safety, and develop actionable protection plans.

Area 2 SEL Hub

ROE4 serves as the Social Emotional Learning (SEL) Hub for Area II, supporting the sixteencounty northwestern region of Illinois with SELspecific coaching, training, and collaboration.

For over four years the Area 2 SEL Hub has worked with schools across the region to develop and implement action plans aligned with mental health and climate goals. SEL Specialists have provided on-site support and trainings to educators using tools like the Trauma Responsive Schools Implementation Assessment (TRSI-A) and more.

Financial Report

Funding Overview

The majority of funding for ROE4's nearly twelve million dollar operating budget comes from competitive private, state, and federal grants as well as fees charged for alternative education, professional services, student services, and professional development. In addition, the salaries for the Regional and Assistant Regional Superintendents are paid by the State of Illinois.

County Budget Summary

A portion of the operating funds of ROE4 is provided by Boone and Winnebago County governments. The following figures represent the portion provided by Winnebago and Boone counties and are based on Winnebago county's fiscal year, which runs from October 1 through September 30.

The Teacher Institute Fund exists to account for fees collected by ROE4 for the registration and renewal of teaching licenses. These fees (and any accumulated fund balance) are restricted for use as described therein, including the following:

- to defray expenses associated with the work of the regional professional development review committees to advise the regional superintendent, upon his or her request, and to hear appeals relating to the renewal of teaching licenses;
- to defray expenses connected with improving the technology necessary for the efficient processing of licenses;
- to defray all costs associated with the administration of teaching licenses;
- to defray expenses incidental to teachers' institutes, workshops or meetings of a professional nature that are designed to promote the professional growth of teachers; or
- for the purpose of defraying the expense of any general or special meeting of teachers or school personnel of the region, which has been approved by the regional superintendent.
